
## Class History


"Where do we go? Into which room do we go?" A group of twenty-one bewildered Freshmen asked each other on that memorable September morning in the year 1935. The upper classmen thought these questions a huge joke and also the "greenies" who were asking them. This Freshmen class gradually became accustomed to their new location and settled down by organizing their members under the leadership of Robert Foreman with the assistance of Lillian Hoxworth as Sec.-Treas. We suffered and the upper classmen sat by and laughed as we were initiated.

The next fall we entered school as Sophomores. The officers were, Pres. Robert Foreman, Sec. Treas Walter Hern. We lost six of our students this year namely: Jack Haur, John Loew, June Purdy (Deceased), Luella Clark, James Smails, and Lorena Markeley. We also gained three members from Blissfield High namely: Betty Duncan, Georgia Duncan, and Hazel Wood. The two main highlights of the year were the Freshmen Initiation Party, and the Sophomore play "Tomboy." Our class was well represented on both the Girls and Boys Basketball teams.

We then left this colorful year to start our Junior year with eighteen members. We lost three members namely: Edward Selders, Lillian Hoxworth, and Lewis Carpenter. We also added one member, Doris Bush from Frazzysburg High School. The class chose the officers as follows: Robert Foreman, Pres.; Walter Hern Vice Pres.; Margaret Coffey, Sec.-Treas. We selected our class color "Orchid and Silver" and our class flower "American Beauty Rose." The highlights of the year were the Junior Class Play, "Girl Shy" and the Junior-Senior Banquet. It was held May 14, at Fisher's Restaurant in Millersburg, after which a show was enjoyed at Schine Theatre in Wooster. Miss Raudabaugh was our class sponsor. We also purchased our class rings that year and helped prepare the year book.

We finally became Seniors, the goal for which we all were striving with a class of





sixteen. We gained one member Deland Geib, making our membership seventeen. We chose our class officers: Walter Hern, Pres.; Wanda Orr, Vice Pres.; Margaret Coffey, Sec. Treas. We chose our class flower, "Sweet Peas." Our motto "Forward ever, backward never." It was now our job to publish the annual year book. We went on a campaign to try to raise money for the class treasury. We sponsored an oyster supper and sold chances on a Fruit Cake at Christmas time. We produced the Senior Class Play entitled "The Haunted Chair" on April 28. We were entertained by the Junior at the Junior-Senior Banquet held May 5 at Millersburg. Baccalaurate was held May 15, with Rev. Smith of Christian Church delivering the sermon. Commencement was held May 19, Rev. Tuck of Wooster delivered the class address at our Commencement Exercises.

We hope that we, the Senior Class of 1939 have left a favorable impression on the faculty and students of the Killbuck High School.


### SENIOR CLASS PROPHECY

I then went on to Hollywood, and there I had the privilege of dining with Gloria. She told me of her success as an actress and how many husbands she had had.






We, the class of 1939, name Mr. D. C. Egger executor of this, our last will and testament.

Item III--We leave to the Sophomore class our ability in scholarship and athletics. To the boys athletics, and the girls, scholarship.







Item IV--We leave the Freshman class the warning that the path of learning isn't to be trifled with. Strive to succeed.

Thus the Clipper "40" ran the first part of her course successfully.



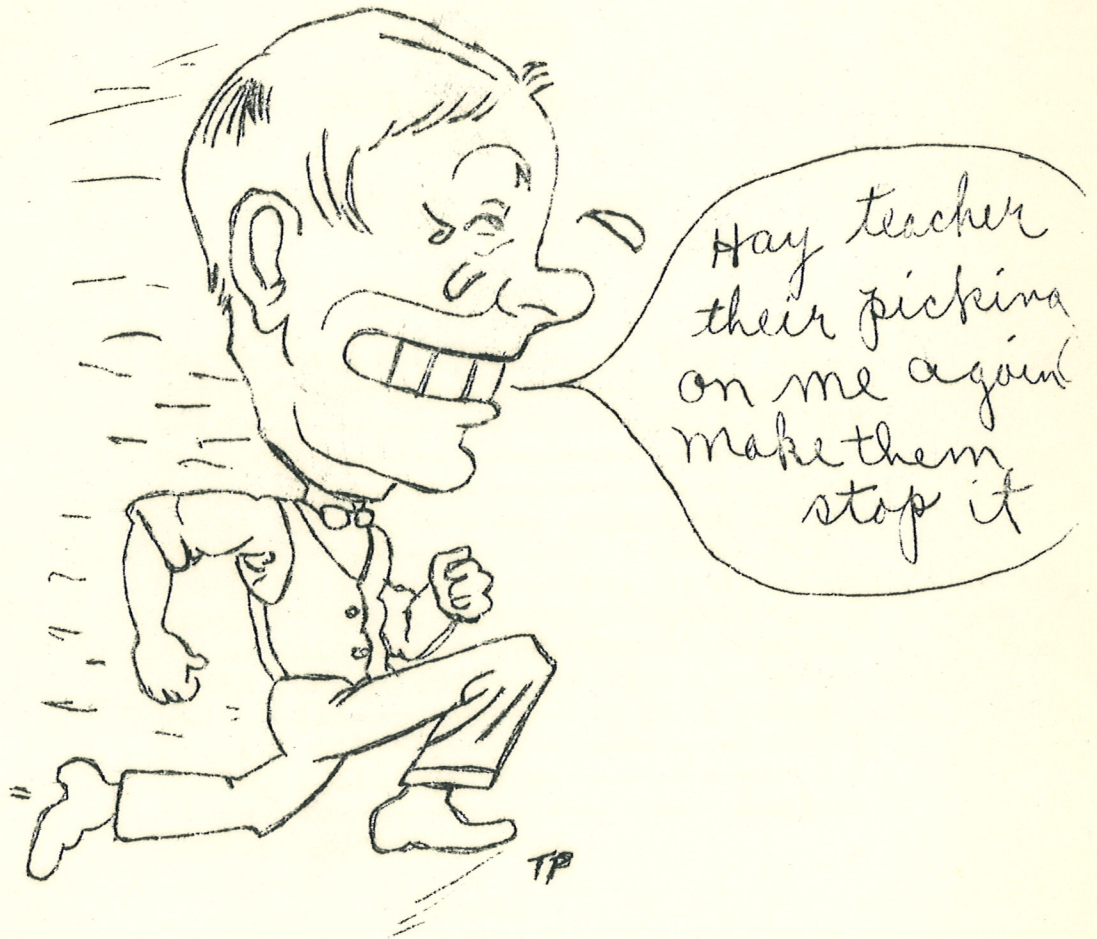

Two members of our class are represented in the orchestra. They are Clyde Conn who plays the trombone and Eileen Neal who plays the mellophone.




Class of 1942

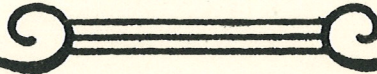
## Boy's Basketball

## ORCHESTRA



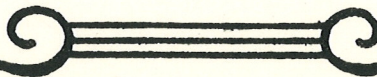

The Home Ec Club holds monthly meetings at the time which class work is put into practice.





One member was to be elected to this board to represent both the Killbuck and Glenmont chapters. At a joint meeting, a coin was flipped to determine whether the Killbuck or Glenmont candidate should represent them. Paul won the toss.

The secretary, Albert Garver; the treasurer, Ralph Reed; and the Vice President, Jimmie Carpenter, all deserve special mention for their good work in their respective offices.

Four members, Ralph Reed, John Waltman, Albert Garver and Jerald Boyd went with a group of members from Glenmont on an educational tour last summer with Mr. Wells, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Crosby, and Superindendant Bateman of Glenmont. Gettysburg, Baltimore, Annapolis, Washington, Mt. Vernon, the Sky-line Drive, Home of Thomas Jefferson and many other points of interest were seen and visited. One thousand two hundred miles were traveled and the trip took six days. The cost to each boy was ten dollars.


All the boys who were members last year are carrying on their livestock projects this year. All members are starting a crop project of some kind. Crop projects are divided between Hybrid Corn and potatoes.


The outstanding project development this year has been the fine litter of pigs belonging to John Waltman. John expects to make the Ohio Ton-litter award this year.

Our work this year has been based on farm crops and proper soil treatment to produce them, including pastures.

Several special trips were taken by the members or by representatives of the members. Early in the fall, we were guests of the Farm Bureau at their fertilizer plant in Alliance. In November we attended the meeting of the Ohio Farm Bureau at Columbus. During Farmers Week we sent delegates to the F.F.A. Leadership Conference at Ohio State University. Lloyd Hawkins and Claude Lawson were delegates and James Allison, Albert Garver and John Waltman were the apple judging team.

One purpose we have had during the year was to do what we could toward overcoming the ravages of erosion and to begin laying the foundation for some income from land on our farms that is now practically worthless for crop production of any kind. First we had Mr. Dowd of the Forestry Department of The Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station come and talk to us on Reforestation. Then each member sent to the Experiment Station five hundred trees







which the experiment station furnished free of charge to our members. These we have planted as a class project. This amounts to about ten acres of land that we have reforested. Mostly White Pine was planted but some Ash and Poplar were also planted.

We could not pass through a school year as members of the Killbuck F.F.A. without entering into some contests. Last fall we played Glenmont in soft-ball several times, had a basketball game with them this winter, and entered into a pest-hunt contest with Glenmont, Millersburg, Big Prairie and Nashville. Last year we won a similar contest but we were beaten this year. The three losers were to feed the two winners. The winners were Millersburg and Nashville. We were hosts to the group. About eighty five boys were present. The early part of the evening was occupied by determining which of the five chapters had the best basketball team. Big Prairie won. Refreshments consisted of pie and ice cream.

About the last big event of our 1938-39 year was the banquet held in conjunction with the girls of the Home Economics Club. This banquet was held on April 29. Both the girls and we invited our parents in to this banquet. This banquet has become an annual affair and we feel that it was a fitting climax to our year of F.F.A. activities.
